1. **The National Children's Alliance is growing!** Five new organizations of both international and national renown have joined the NCA, adding their voices to our collective advocacy on behalf of children and youth. The Alliance is pleased to welcome:

- **The Students' Commission** has created a proactive forum for youth to direct public policy. National Reports are presented to the Prime Minister, the Governor General, cabinet ministers, provincial premiers and business, education, community and labour leaders across Canada.
- **Canadian Movement for Literacy's** mission is to be a national voice for literacy for every Canadian through networking, research, government liaison, learner development, communication, collaboration and building the capacity to support the people and organizations involved with adult literacy education.
- **National Association of Friendship Centres** seeks to improve the quality of life for Aboriginal peoples in an urban environment by supporting self-determined activities which encourage equal access to, and participation in, Canadian Society; and which respect and strengthen the increasing emphasis on Aboriginal cultural distinctiveness.
- **Street Kids International** is an organization based in Canada that works internationally to raise awareness about the needs and rights of street youth, provide training and capacity building opportunities that introduce youth-centred methods for working with street youth, develop a global network of organizations and front-line workers striving to support local street youth, co-develop with this global network the best-practices and materials for meeting the needs of street youth.
- **Defence for Children International – Canada (DCI)** is an independent international non-governmental organization, with headquarters in Geneva, that was set up during the International Year of the Child (1979) to ensure on-going, practical, systematic and concerted international action specially directed towards promoting and protecting the rights of the child.

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## NEWS FOR OUR MEMBERS:

**1. Call for papers: Childhoods 2005 Conference, 29 June – 5 July, 2005, Oslo, Norway.** The network on Social Indicators of Children's Well-Being in Emerging and Transforming Societies will be holding an international conference on children and youth in these communities. Organizers are inviting the submission of research on sets or systems of indicators related to children's well being in specific local, national or multi-national contexts, on empirical analysis and production of data and on the use of data to affect public policy. The focus will be on indicators of well-being for categories/groups of children at multinational, national, regional or community levels, on theoretical approaches to the identification and use of child well-being indicators, as well as on case studies and comparative research. Papers will be presented as workshops, panels and posters. The deadline for submitting abstracts is 20 October 2004. Please see <http://childhoods2005.uio.no> for more information.

**2. Family Service Canada will be holding their 2004 national conference from 21 to 23 October in Sydney, Nova Scotia.** Proposals are being sought for workshop topics reflecting the overall theme of the conference, "Fostering Peace in Individuals, Families and Communities...Imagine!!!". **2. Save the Children International is carrying out research on NGO participation in the work of the Committee on the Rights of the Child.** It is interested in collecting information from NGOs that have carried out monitoring and reporting activities that have contributed to improved data collection on children; enhanced the dialogue and interaction between Government and NGOs on the process, contents and quality of the official country report; and strengthened the accountability of State Parties as the main duty bearers in relation to the implementation of the Convention. **3. The Canadian Association for Community Living** has been on the Canadian government delegation to the Children’s Congresses since 1994. The involvement of CACL in these policy meetings has meant a shift from a focus on just the provision of health services to a framework of human rights and inclusion. The goal of the Congress is to allow for multi-disciplinary teams from around the world to exchange information about ways to develop national policies and how to establish local systems of health, education and social services for children with disabilities in their home communities. The Congress will also serve as the foundation for developing an international network that will foster an ongoing dialogue among nations about philosophies, policies, legislation, funding and practices used to help children with disabilities maximize their potential. The theme of this year’s conference is “Towards Full Citizenship” and it will focus on what has to be done to reach the goal of full citizenship for disabled young people in different parts of the world. 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## ISSUE ALERT:

**1. Aboriginal leaders from across the country held a one-day summit on 18 April with Prime Minister Paul Martin.** The topics discussed included health care, housing and education to economic opportunities for native people on and off reserves, proposals to restructure the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs, and a reporting system so native leaders can update Parliament on progress made in tackling various problems. Aboriginal leaders said the issues of poverty, crime, substance abuse and suicide are too important to be ignored forever, and they can't afford to give up hope that the federal government is serious about change. Critics have said Monday's gathering did not once address the problems specific to the segments of the Aboriginal population that are children and youth, elderly and disabled, and said it was nothing more than a well-orchestrated photo opportunity for the prime minister in an election-charged environment.

**2. Private health care firms eyeing First Nations communities:** The Muskeg Lake Cree Nation in Saskatchewan says it plans to build a private, for-profit MRI in an aboriginal-run medical facility in Saskatoon. When it is finished the brand new medical centre will house doctors, physiotherapists and dietitians - as well as the first on-reserve, for-profit MRI in Canada.

Lester Lafond is the band member who is behind the project. "We have the right," he says, "... the right in this country to open this type of facility. It is our land. We are here first and foremost to put projects on our land to try to generate revenue."

The idea started with Ottawa's devolution of responsibility for health to First Nations. It quickly became a business opportunity for the Muskeg Lake Cree. Ottawa is paying for a feasibility study and private firms, including US-based ones, are lining up to invest.

Saskatchewan's Health Minister John Nilson is dead set against the plan which he says "breaches the Canada Health Act." Nilson says those who charge more than medicare covers break the law and create problems for the public system. "These private MRIs take away staff from the public MRIs and we have some

challenges getting staff already in Saskatchewan and we don't want to compound that by having another MRI."

While Muskeg Lake is the only band formally proposing a private MRI now, it says other First Nations across Saskatchewan and across Canada could follow suit.

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
